ASH WEDNESDAY

Each Ash Wednesday, I think about the summer of AD1188, when Archbishop Baldwin of Canterbury traveled through Wales, preaching the Third Crusade. He was accompanied by the historian Gerald of Wales, and Gerald recorded the numbers of people who 'accepted the Cross' at the various towns and villages which they passed through. It seems that each of those who agreed to go on the crusade, which aimed to reach and to liberate Jerusalem, was handed a rough cross made of fabric to pin to their person.

On Ash Wednesday, we 'accept the Cross', as those people did so long ago. Only the Cross that we accept at the beginning of Lent is not a

cross cut from fabric, but the cross of ash, traced on our forehead. Nevertheless it is likewise a sign of our intention: of our intention to make that sixweek journey through the season which is Lent. And our destination is likewise the holy city of Jerusalem. We travel there not to set the city free, as the crusaders hoped to do, but rather to remember and rejoice in the freedom that was won there by Our Lord Jesus Christ, through his dying and his rising. Our goal, as we make this journey, is the cross on which Jesus died, and the sepulchre from which he rose. There, in Jerusalem, with our hearts and minds we will enter once more into the mystery of our redemption. It is an experience, as we know from past years, which can bring about a renewal in our trust in Jesus, and in our love for him.

So when in the liturgy on Wednesday we once more 'accept the cross', we are saying 'Yes' to the proposal which the Church makes to us: the proposal that we should travel together during the next six weeks, full of purpose, determination, and anticipation. Of course we will meet with difficulties and discouragements. We will be tempted to give up - to turn away from the Lent Rule which we've made for ourselves. We will be tempted to cease from prayer, to ease up on our self-denial, and to limit the scope of our almsgiving. The devil, we must remember, doesn't want us to keep a good Lent, and he will try to prevent us from doing so. But please God, having accepted the cross on Wednesday, we will stand firm, and in due course reach Easter the better able to share in the Paschal victory. We have a goal. Together, let's try to achieve it!
