Blessed Peace We – or at least a handful of people – are getting a little noisy before Mass, both on weekdays and on Sundays. People have a right to quietness before Mass, so that they can prepare themselves for the liturgy. It is most inconsiderate to make this difficult for them through talking. Do please be understanding. And maybe pray yourself, rather than chat........ Also – it's grumble time – it is inconsiderate to drive away from church before the Mass is ended. We can all hear the crunching of the tyres on the gravel, and the noise is louder than you perhaps realize. Please be thoughtful, and courteous.

VERY TOUCHING

A weeks ago, the Sunday Gospel related the incident when Jairus, a synagogue official, came to Jesus and asked him to come and heal his sick daughter, and in which Jesus, whilst on the way to Jairus' house, also healed a woman with a long-

term haemorrhage. At the time, we noticed the importance of touching: Jairus asked Jesus to come and 'lay his hands' on the sick child, and when eventually he reached the house, he 'took the child by the hand'. Meanwhile the woman with the haemorrhage 'touched Jesus' cloak', and was healed. The importance of touching.

Since then I've been on my annual Retreat to Downside Abbey, and whilst I was praying in the Abbey church one morning, a woman came to the nearby statue of the Sacred Heart, and not noticing me, went up to it and with reverence and devotion touched the wounds of Our Lord. She, like Jairus and the woman in the Gospel, clearly felt that it was important to touch.......

Why? Well I suppose that touching someone or something establishes some kind of link, or contact, between the toucher and the touched; it puts us in some kind of way 'in touch' with them. Jairus, the women in the gospel, and the woman in the abbey were all seeking something from the Lord, and instinctively felt that by establishing contact through touching, grace could flow out from him and into them. Rather like — but this may be a crude analogy - putting a plug into a socket so that the electric current can flow through and empower.

What can be touched, what is physical, is very real to us. We, or at least our bodies, are material, physical. And the divine Word has been made flesh, and dwelt amongst us. So that our God can be touched. Not now in the way in which the woman with a haemorrhage could touch him, but yet in a more profound way than that in which the woman with the statue used her sense of touch. For the Word continues to manifest himself under the outward forms of Bread and Wine, and in this way He touches us and we touch Him. And in this encounter of touching, we believe that grace does indeed flow out from the Lord into the communicant. At the Altar, we establish physical contact with the Lord. It is something very mysterious and very wonderful. And also very real. On Monday – tomorrow – we celebrate the Transfiguration of the Lord. We will hear of light flowing from Jesus on the holy mountain. And we will recall that as light flowed from him then, just so grace flows from him now.
