The Hypocrisy Trap

It's easy to be religious, but it's not easy to be Christian. It's easy to go to church, carry a bible and look prayerful, but it's not always easy to put faith into action. Even when we do put our faith into action it's hard not to want people to notice how good we are being.

Yet again the Pharisees are in Jesus' bad books. "... Do whatever they teach," Jesus advises, "but do not do as they do, for they do

not practice what they preach." Jesus accuses the religious leaders of hypocrisy. "They tie up heavy burdens hard to bear and lay them on the shoulders of others." "They do all their deeds to be seen by others." Jesus is telling us that if we start placing more emphasis on outer conduct rather than on inner character we are hypocrites. We are hypocrites if we do good deeds not for the love of others but for love of the spotlight.

None of us set out to be hypocrites, so perhaps we shouldn't be quite so harsh on the Pharisees. Hypocrisy is a very easy trap to fall into. We are constantly dishing out advice as parents, as teachers, as counsellors and as best friends advice we are often guilty of not following ourselves. Hypocrisy is a very human failing. We want to be one thing but end up being another. Then instead of owning up to our weaknesses we pretend to be something that we're not and then want praise and admiration into the bargain!

Today Jesus gives us an all-important strategy for avoiding the hypocrisy trap. Stay humble! If we can develop a genuine motivation to look to the interests of others we are less likely to crave personal glory.

Advent is coming up quite soon and during Advent we will be singing The Belmont Mass as a change to The New Peoples' Mass. The mood and feeling of the liturgy changes throughout the year and Advent is a season of joyful hope. The Gloria is not sung during Advent.

Remembrance Sunday: November 12th - 11.00am Mass will be a Requiem Mass for the Fallen of the two World Wars and subsequent conflicts. Mass will be preceded by the Silence.

Additional Eucharistic Prayers. I have been using these additional prayers on Fridays for some time now. They are printed in The Parish Mass Book and can be used on Sundays either with their own preface or a seasonal one. I feel that using these will add a bit of variety to our celebration and may just help our attention a bit. In an ideal world we should just listen to the Scripture and Eucharistic Prayers and not follow them in books, but the books are there for those who would like to read them.

Red Wednesday, 22nd November - Red Wednesday is a national initiative to highlight the persecution of Christians and to raise the profile of Religious Freedom. Churches and cathedrals across the country shall be lit in red as a sign of solidarity to Christian martyrs, including Westminster Cathedral. Masses shall be celebrated and prayers said for the persecuted church. In Norwich, our own Catholic cathedral will be lit up in red

and Bishop Alan Hopes shall be celebrating Mass at 7.00pm. In addition, the Catholic National Shrine in Walsingham will also be lit up in red. See the poster at the back of Church for more information.
