HAVE YOU GOT YOUR ANSWER READY?

4: 'WHY SHOULDN'T A WOMAN HAVE AN ABORTION? IT'S HER BODY, AFTER ALL'

It is quite true that a woman who finds herself with an unwanted pregnancy has rights, because yes, her body is deeply involved in the situation. But she is not the only one who has rights, not the only one whose rights and well-being must be taken into consideration. There is also the unborn child, which also, like the mother, has rights. And central to his or her rights is the right to life.

We Catholics believe that once conception has taken place, a new person has come into being; that God has given that person a soul, and the potential to gradually develop into a fullyfashioned human being. In a surprisingly short time the embryo becomes recognizable as a person. What the mother is bearing in her womb doesn't suddenly become a human being at the moment of birth, or just a few weeks earlier. That is ridiculous. Of course those who find abortion convenient or profitable don't like to refer to what they kill in the womb as a 'baby'; but that's what it is. And the action, in breaking the commandment 'Thou shalt not kill' goes not just against human law, but against natural law – law which has been embedded by God in the very nature of things. Killing a fellow human being is always wrong, and it is especially horrible when a mother gives consent to the action. Because the love of a mother for its offspring is something else which is embedded in the natural order of things.

So we Catholics can't accept that the mother has a right to kill, or to consent in the killing, of her child. For killing is what abortion is. Its supporters prefer to call it 'termination', which sounds nicer. There is much double-thinking and hypocrisy in this matter.

We must, of course, always feel a real sympathy for women whose lives have got in a mess, and most especially for those women who have been raped. We must be compassionate always, whilst recognizing and naming what is wrong.

There are two things that the Church must do. First, to strongly oppose abortion, a wrong which is so widespread in our society. We must take every opportunity to talk about the value and sacredness of human life. But second, we must give every help to women who are tempted to use abortion as a last resort. They need support and practical help. And as for those women who have had abortions, they too will need our help, because often they are traumatized, and for long afterwards feel a burden of guilt. We need to show them the mercy and compassion of our loving God.
