A Change of Heart

Much of television transmission over Christmas will be taken up by soaps. As sophisticated audiences we have become familiar with how soaps work. We understand that soaps have certain character types and that those characters rarely change their spots. We have become accustomed to watching characters making the same old mistakes over and over again. They may show remorse for their failings, they may even promise their loved ones that they can be different, but we know deep down that they cannot change. We know that

sooner or later they will go slipping on those same old banana skins.

In today's gospel we are being taught an important lesson. We are taught that repentance is more than just being sorry. We can be sorry yet re-offend. We can be sorry that we have told a lie yet lie again. We can be sorry that we have succumbed to crime or self indulgence, yet go down that path again. The true meaning of repentance means to change direction to choose a different path altogether.

Choosing a new path sounds easy. It obviously isn't or the world would already be a perfect place. We all know what changes we would like to make in our own lives, and we know equally well the excuses we use that bar our path to God.

In Luke's gospel, John tells us, "Prepare the way of the Lord, make straight his paths. Every valley shall be filled and every mountain and hill shall be made low. The winding roads shall be made straight, and the rough ways made smooth..."

We are being told that Advent is a time of preparation and of change. In the same way that Dickens' immortal Scrooge secured his salvation by changing his ways, so too must we choose a new path through life and smooth our way along it by clearing the obstacles. Rebuilding our lives might not be something we can do overnight, but we can all begin with the will to be different the will to change direction a change of heart.

PARISH PRAYER - Father, pour out your Spirit upon our parish. Grant us a new vision of your glory, a new faithfulness to your Word, and a new consecration to your service; that your love might grow among us and your Kingdom come.

Bible Sunday 2015 - On the second Sunday of Advent, 6th December 2015, parishes are invited to celebrate Catholic Bible Sunday. This year's theme is 'Embracing the Gospel of Mercy'. This year's celebration comes just days before Pope Francis will open the Jubilee Year of Mercy. An important way in which believers and non-believers alike

encounter the 'balm of mercy' is through the Bible stories and texts. It is therefore hoped that on Catholic Bible Sunday this year two things will be invited and encouraged:

- To read the Gospel of Luke, also known as the 'Gospel of Mercy'.
- Once someone has read the Gospel, that they gift it to someone else who perhaps isn't a Christian.

The Immaculate Conception of Mary - December 8th - Like the Solemnity of Mary, the Mother of God, the feast of the Immaculate Conception, celebrated during Advent, is related to the mystery of Jesus. To fulfil her unique role in the mission of Jesus, Mary was conceived free from original sin through the foreseen merits of her Son.

Year of Mercy - 8th December 2015 - Pope Francis has initiated a 'Year of Mercy' that will be celebrated in the Catholic Church from 8th December 2015. It's a time to focus on God's mercy and forgiveness. To mark this, many of the Bishops of England and Wales have recorded special reflections for Advent. the past when we have been in the wrong. This month we are asked to join in Pope Francis' prayer intention, "That all may experience the mercy of God, who never tires of forgiving."
