#### **GOSPEL REFLECTION FOR THE ASCENSION**

#### Abandoned?



The trouble with the Ascension is that we're left with a feeling of abandonment. We imagine Jesus going to some place high above the clouds, or to some faraway place beyond death. If the disciples felt any sense of abandonment that's certainly not how they acted. Notice that the disciples didn't leave the scene of the Ascension in mourning; they returned with great joy and praised God in the temple day after day. It is clear that the disciples did not experience Jesus as absent. It is clear that in everything they

did from then on that Jesus was real and present in their lives. It's true that Jesus is no longer with us physically, but he has not left us; he has simply handed over the reins.

Like every good teacher who eventually trusts his students to stand on their own two feet, so Jesus finally trusts his disciples to carry the baton. So too, we need to think of Jesus, not in a far off kind of way, but as part of our lives and part of our daily decisions.

The focus of today's gospel reading is exaltation and mission. It's time for us to stop looking into the sky wondering where Jesus has gone, and focus on the important business of putting his teaching into action. It's time to dismiss any notion of mourning Jesus' physical absence and rejoice in his guiding presence in our daily lives.

World Communications Day - Communication and Mercy: A Fruitful Encounter - Sunday 8<sup>th</sup> May - This year's theme was decided in order to coincide with the Extraordinary Jubilee of Mercy, the Holy Year called by Pope Francis to announce the Mercy of God, and gives us an opportunity to think about the connection between communication and mercy. We are asked to think about the language we use when we reach out to others. How well do we express welcome, availability and forgiveness. Could we for instance use social networks to heal memories and build peace and harmony. Once again, Pope Francis is reminding us that, in its essence, communication is a profoundly human achievement. Good communication is never merely the product of the latest or most developed technology, but is realized within the context of a deep interpersonal relationship.

Pope Francis Prayer Intention for May - This month we focus on the stark reality that women in developing countries suffer disproportionately from poor access to health services, discrimination, the effects of war, and, at times, victimization by harmful traditions and trafficking. Women around the globe

should be celebrated for their extraordinary contributions in all areas of society — as professionals, as bread-winners, and as carers. This month Pope Francis asks us to join in his prayer intention for May, "...That in every country of the world, women may be honoured and respected and that their essential contribution to society may be highly esteemed."

Mary's Month - There is a sense amongst some people that since Vatican II, Mary has been demoted, especially in the liturgy. A familiar lament is, "We don't sing Mary's songs at Mass anymore, not even during her month of May." This may be true, but not without good reason. The Easter Season lasts from the Easter Vigil until Pentecost Sunday, and depending on the date of Easter, we can be celebrating this 50 day festive mid May. A song like 'Immaculate Mary' probably would not fit. But this doesn't mean that Mary has been 'demoted'. Today the Church tells us that whilst honouring Christ's mother, these devotions should not overshadow her Son .... this after all, is the last thing Mary would have wanted. This month Pope Francis asks us to pray the Holy Rosary for evangelisation and peace.
