The Price of Oil.

We can nag our children endlessly about homework, buy them every book and piece of equipment they might conceivably need and pack their school bags every night, but at the end of the day we can't go to school and do the work for them. At exam time we can borrow essays and pick each other's brains, but

at the end of the day no one can sit the exam for us. A job interview looms, and we run round seeking help and advice, but the final preparations must be ours and ours alone. It seems there are certain things for which we alone must take responsibility.

In today's gospel, five wise bridesmaids and five foolish bridesmaids take their lamps and await the arrival of the groom. The groom is delayed, and by the time he arrives, the foolish bridesmaids have run out of oil and are forced to ask the wise bridesmaids for a loan. "No," reply the wise bridesmaids, "there will not be enough for you and for us." It might seem as though the wise bridesmaids were being a little less than generous, but this isn't a lesson in sharing. The lesson teaches us that there are some kinds of oil we just can't borrow.

The foolish bridesmaids stand for all those who waste their lives forever accepting mediocrity. The foolish bridesmaids stand for all those who save their good intentions up for 'tomorrow and tomorrow and tomorrow'. The foolish bridesmaids stand for those who imagine that good deeds are the responsibility of others. The foolish bridesmaids stand for all of us who think there is plenty of time left to fill up on our spiritual reserves.

What would it cost to fill up our spiritual reserves right now? Perhaps not as much as we might think! No one is suggesting that we all rush off and become Trappist Monks, but at the same time, how much less mediocre our lives would become if we got into the very good habit of living each and every day as though it was our last.

Lockdown Arrangements - During Lockdown the church will be left open for private prayer after Mass each day till about 4.00 pm. The partition doors are closed but please let yourselves in. The toilet, the servery and the confessional remain out of use. You can light candles, pray the rosary, do the stations or just be quiet in the presence of the Lord.

Bishops' Conference Guidance - The latest guidance to be received from the Bishops' Conference General Secretary on the present lockdown restrictions can be found on the parish website. The contents are meant as a pastoral response to a new situation which is different from the previous lockdown, namely that our churches may remain open and that attending a place of worship for individual prayer is a legitimate reason to leave home. There is also encouragement to continue charitable works which are based at our churches. Key points are:

- Churches may be used for Mass and other services to be streamed, without a
 congregation present. Musicians and singers may participate in online services,
 as long as they usually form part of the service that is being broadcast and are
 essential to its delivery.
- Churches are permitted to continue to be open to offer support and charitable outreach, including the provision of food banks or other support for the homeless

- or the vulnerable. It is so important that this response to the pandemic, which has been such a significant part of parish life over these past months in so many places, continues and develops.
- Funeral Masses and funeral services may continue to be celebrated, with an
 attendance of up to 30 people (not including those who are required for the
 celebration). Weddings are only permitted when one of those getting married is
 seriously ill and is not expected to recover. Such weddings are limited to 6 people
 excluding the priest or deacon celebrant.
- In the light of the broad aim to minimise gatherings of those from different households, and to focus resources on keeping churches open for individual prayer, it is recommended that catechism classes and sacramental preparation sessions are suspended, or held online, whilst these Regulations are in force.

Statement by Catholic Bishops' Conference of England and Wales: The President and the Vice-President of the Bishops' Conference have issued a Statement in response to the new national lockdown. A copy of the Statement dated 4th November 2020 can be read on the parish website.

November, Month of the Faithful Departed - During the month of November, we pray for all our deceased family members and friends. We aim to remember how they helped and loved us whilst they were with us and we commit to keeping their memory alive by adopting the qualities we most admired in them. We also pray for those who have died that have fought for our way of life and our religious freedom, and we pray for those who have died alone who have no one to remember them.

Remembrance Sunday, 8th November 2020 - Remembrance Sunday falls on the Sunday nearest Armistice Day, 11 November, which marks the end of the First World War. On this day are remembered all those who gave their lives for their country, all who suffered and died through acts of war and those who were left behind to grieve and mourn. On this day we are asked to pray for peace and reconciliation between nations, that enemies may put aside all differences and for all those who have died through war or acts of violence in defence of our country, may we never forget their sacrifice.

CAFOD FAMILY FAST DAY 2020 - Thank you from CAFOD to all parishioners at Sacred Heart & St Margaret Mary for their prayers, fasting, and generosity. **The parish donated £271**. Your donations this Harvest mean that we can continue to reach more families threatened by coronavirus. Working through the local Church, amazing work is already happening. In Kenya, Sister Modeasther distributed food and essential items to 300 vulnerable families at St Michael's Catholic Parish. There are many more local experts working with the poorest communities and these stories are signs of great hope during crisis. We are one family and together we will survive, rebuild, and heal.
