

GOSPEL REFLECTION FOR THE 28TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME



Must Try Harder!

Do we fondly imagine that people ought to love us just the way we are? We are told often enough that God loves us warts and all. But do we carry this belief through life with not much thought of betterment?

In today's parable a king invites guests to his son's wedding. When the guests refuse to turn up, the king extends the invitation to a different set of guests, both good and bad. The guests fill the wedding hall, but as they do so, the king notices one man not wearing a wedding robe and he has him bound hand and foot and thrown out into the darkness! The consequences for not wearing the right outfit seem overly harsh as far as this poor guest is concerned, but of course the parable has not really very much to do with wedding receptions and even less to do with wearing the right tie. The overriding theme in this story is to do with standards.

Jesus explains that the Kingdom of God is open to all but that doesn't mean that anyone and everyone can stroll into heaven. Just as guests make an effort to be correctly dressed for a wedding, so too must we put in the preparation and effort to be accepted into God's Kingdom.

The guest who was thrown out of the wedding feast for his cavalier 'accept me just the way I am' attitude presents a warning for us all. Too often we go about our daily routines not feeling any need to live life better. Far too often we look on our Christianity as making choices between good and evil, and we are confident that we rarely choose evil. But Jesus is asking more of us than simply choosing between right and wrong, he is asking us to choose between good and an even greater good. What we imagine is our 'best' very rarely is.

Just as the guest in today's parable did little more than turn up to the wedding, so we live life going through the motions but not much more. Accepting God's invitation to join him is only the first step, it's how we live out that acceptance that really matters.

Papal Encyclical Letter 'Fratelli Tutti' - On October 4th Pope Francis sent out a new Encyclical Letter on Fraternity and Social Friendship, *Fratelli Tutti*. A synopsis of the Encyclical, together with Questions and Answers, are available to read on the parish website. The introduction to the Synopsis explains that "Inspired by Saint Francis of Assisi, Pope Francis gives us Fratelli tutti, a proposal for a way of life marked by the flavour of the Gospel. It is a call to love others as brothers and sisters, even when they are far from us; it

is a call to open fraternity (FT 1), to recognizing and loving every person with a love without borders; it is a call to encounter others in a way that is capable of overcoming all distance and every temptation to engage in disputes, impositions, or submissions (FT 3). Fratelli tutti does not claim to offer a complete teaching on fraternal love, but seeks rather to consider its universal scope (FT 6). COVID-19 forced the Pope to interrupt his writing of Fratelli tutti. This pandemic has exposed our false securities, our fragmentation, and our inability to work together (FT 7). In the face of present-day attempts to eliminate or to ignore others, Fratelli tutti is an invitation to respond to God's call with a new vision of fraternity and social friendship (FT 6). The Holy Father hopes that, in these times, we can contribute to the rebirth of a universal aspiration to fraternity by acknowledging the dignity of each and every human person (FT 8)."

St. Teresa of Avila (1515-1582), 15th October – "It was the 16th Century, an age of exploration as well as political, social and religious upheaval. Though a contemplative, Teresa spent much of her time and energy seeking to reform herself and the Carmelites. She founded over a half-dozen new monasteries. She travelled, wrote, and fought for reform. Ours too is a time of turmoil, a time of reform and a time of liberation. Modern women have in Teresa a challenging example. Promoters of renewal, promoters of prayer, all have in Teresa a woman to reckon with, one whom they can admire and imitate." ~*American Catholic*

The first Chairman, the late Dr. Edward Carpenter, former Dean of Westminster, established the guiding principle of the Week in the words "*The peace of the world must be prayed for by all the faiths of the world.*" The Week of Prayer for World Peace Annual Gathering will be online this year. Churches' Week of Action on Food, 11-17 October 2020 - 11-17 October is an opportunity for Christians all over the world to act and speak out together on food justice issues. Impacted by Covid-19, the number of people facing acute food insecurity is expected to nearly double to 265 million in 2020, from 135 million in 2019. We recall the episode of Jesus feeding the multitude (*Matthew 14:13-21*). "We have no excuses but to respond to this crisis together, sharing what we have, in faith, to ensure that all are fed, leaving nobody behind, and with no food being wasted." The week in October incorporates the International Day for Rural Women (October 15), World Food Day (October 16) and the International Day for the Eradication of Poverty (October 17).
