GOSPEL REFLECTION FOR THE FIFTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME



In One Ear

"In one ear and out of the other," is an expression that could be applied to most of us, for at least some of the time. Today's gospel is about the difference between simply hearing something and really listening. Jesus uses the parable of the sower and the seeds to illustrate the different ways

in which God's word can be received or not!

Firstly, the sower drops seeds on a path only to be eaten by the birds. Jesus is describing those of us who hear the word but neither understands nor even tries to understand it. Next the sower drops seeds on rocky ground and the plants grow quickly but die off because the roots are not nourished. Jesus is describing those of us who receive the word without any real thought or commitment. Without foundation our faith can soon falter when put to the test. Then Jesus describes the seeds which fall among thorns. Sometimes we want to live by Jesus' teachings but worldly demands and temptation choke our good intentions. Lastly Jesus praises the good soil which enables the seeds to grow and bear fruit.

The parable of the sower and the seeds is clearly challenging us to be better prepared to receive the seed of the gospel. It is all too easy for us to go through the motions of listening when really not much is going on between our ears at all. The Bible is a treasure trove of inspiration but because it was written such a long time ago in words that aren't always easily understood we are often inclined to switch off. Do we come to church expecting to be bored by the readings or confused and indifferent before one word is even read? How different things might be if we allowed God's Word to impact our lives.

Listening is more than just opening our ears. Listening is about studying, learning, understanding ...and most importantly, turning that understanding into action.

Diary Dates for this week – All parish group meetings currently remain suspended.

Live Streaming of Mass - Weekend and daily Mass is now live streamed from Sacred Heart. The response of parishioners who have viewed Mass from Sacred Heart has been very positive.

Sunday Mass - The experience of celebrating Mass in public for the first time since lock down was very uplifting. There was a real sense of joy in the church at being able to attend Mass and receive Holy Communion and this has continued during the week. Our liturgical prayer life is not back to normal yet - not by a long stretch of the imagination - but this is a start, a step in the right direction and very, very welcome.

Church opening - Now that we have public Mass again the need for two hours opening seems to have receded. The church will now be closed shortly after Mass each day. Thank you to all of you who have kept vigil.

Readers for Sunday and Weekday Mass - Although there is no rota at the moment your ministry of reading in still needed. Readers are asked to wear the disposable gloves

provided as you have to touch the lectern and lectionary. Please speak to me about reading before Mass at the weekend and weekdays. Thanks.

Public Mass - A reminder of the guidance for the celebration of Mass in public:

- Please be aware that there is a limit to how many people may attend Mass at any one time — numbers for each Mass are restricted to 50 people. A steward is needed to count the people on entering the church.
- * Please keep the **Social Distance of 1 metre +** and use the hand sanitisers on entry and leaving. Families and households can sit together.
- * There are no Mass or hymn books in the church. Please use Universalis or your own missal.
- * There will be no singing and Holy Communion will be distributed in the hand only. I will make the necessary announcements before Mass.
- * The toilet and the servery are out of use.
- * Volunteers are needed to help clean the church.

Your co-operation is essential to the health and safety of everyone.

Sea Sunday, 12th July 2020 (Collections postponed) - On 12th July Christians around the world will celebrate Sea Sunday. We are asked to pray for seafarers and fishers and their families, many of whom are facing financial and personal difficulties during these challenging times. In England and Wales, the Catholic Bishops have decided to postpone the Sea Sunday 2020 collection from July 12th to December. The date has not yet been finalised, but it is likely to be either Sunday 13th or Sunday 20th December.

The Legend of St Swithin (15th July): Any truth? - There is an old legend, trotted out every year, that the summer's weather can be predicted by observing what happens on St.

Swithin's day, 15th July. If it rains on St. Swithin's Day, the tradition says, it will rain every day for the next 40 days. Can there be any truth in the saying? Apparently yes! Obviously, it's not the case that the 15th July sets out the weather for the next 40 days for sure, but there is a pattern whereby the weather in mid-July sets the stage for what is to follow. The jet-stream's position, for example, greatly affects British weather in the summer, and its

position is often fixed by mid-July for several weeks thereafter. So, the weather for a week either side of St. Swithin's Day is indeed a general indication of what the rest of the summer's weather may be like.
