Playing Dixie

Is it human nature only to do our best when the chips are down? We work our hardest when there's an exam or an inspection on the horizon. We struggle to finish our accounts when the tax department deadline is looming. We rush round putting our house in order when visitors are announced, and sadly, many of us leave it until we are elderly or ill before we patch up relationships. In a way we live our lives 'playing Dixie', not living the way we ought all of the time, but only when we get some kind of wake up call.

Today's gospel warns us to be alert to the signs of the end of the world and the coming of judgment day, but not in a 'playing Dixie' kind of way! It would be immature discipleship to prepare for judgment day only when we suspect that we are close to the end of life. In any case we are warned that we do not know the hour or the day of the world's end, and therefore we must live every day as though it were our last. We do not aim to live in a state of permanent fear of being caught out, but because we know that abiding by Jesus' teaching is the most fruitful way to live.

The trick is, to prioritise on a daily basis. How much of what we do is 'life and death'? How much of what we do is genuinely important? Everything in the heavens and earth will pass away. Everything that we consider important will end, but Christ's teaching, and God's priorities will endure.

Sacrament of Reconciliation: Satisfaction - So far we have looked at Contrition, becoming sorry about sinning. Confession is the identification of the way in which we have sinned and now the 3rd part is Satisfaction. Sin is social. It is not just a private matter of me offending God, but it also affects other people whom we have hurt or neglected to love. Sin diminishes us as an effective Sign of Christ's presence in the world and by an act of Penance, usually a prayer, we make up for this. The penance we take on is the satisfaction we make for the damage our, your, my sin does.

Feast of the Presentation of Mary - 21st **November -** As with Mary's birth, we read of Mary's presentation in the temple only in apocryphal literature. In what is recognized as an unhistorical account, the Protoevangelium of James tells us that Anna and Joachim offered Mary to God in the Temple when she was three years old. This was to carry out a promise made to God when Anna was still childless. Even though the feast has no basis in history, it stresses the important truth that from the beginning of her life, Mary was dedicated to God.

News from our own Rome Correspondent, Mike Brookes – "Six weeks in, and the pace is showing no signs of slowing yet. I've just finished my first extended essay, but have two more to complete before Christmas, along with three class presentations, as well as voice and singing lessons, learning how to use a thurifer (!) and beginning rehearsals for the Christmas concert (it's a tradition that the concert is produced and performed by the first year to mark the end of their induction at the college). But all of this is manageable because of the clear structure of our daily routine, giving us time for prayer, academic

work, domestic duties and personal development; and also because the staff and students all work together to make sure that everyone is able to do their best in working to develop the skills and knowledge needed for future ministry. The teaching and support staff are a mixture of English, Scottish, Irish, Italians and Americans, and the students come from even further afield – England, Scotland, Ireland, Australia, Canada, the United States, India, Malaysia, Ghana, Nigeria, Lithuania, and the West Indies. This gives a great richness of experience and also a marvellous sense of the universal nature of the Church and her mission. And of course all our efforts are made possible by your support, most of all in your prayers. It is a great comfort to me to think of my home diocese and her people continuing their lives day by day as we engage in our own mission here, separated by thousands of miles but joined in the Spirit. Thank you for your ongoing help, and best wishes to you all.
