## **GOSPEL REFLECTION FOR THE FIRST SUNDAY OF ADVENT**

#### Lessons From the Ark



We know that we can die at any time. We all know that we could get run over by a bus before the day is out or get diagnosed at any time with a life threatening illness. Despite this we still naively expect people to die in the right order. We expect a great

grandparent to die first, then the old lady who works in the corner shop who has just reached retirement, and lastly the young man who lives in the flat downstairs who runs everyone's messages. So when the young man dies before the great grandparent we are left in a state of bewildered shock. It's just something we weren't expecting. Common sense tells us that we can die at any time, but our hearts tell us something different. Perhaps that is why we are so bad at planning our spiritual future. For most of us, it just isn't high up in our priorities. For most of us, the here and now hasn't got much to do with our spiritual future. Our spiritual future is always something we can catch up on at a later date. That's probably what Noah's neighbours thought too!

Advent is a time of looking at life from a long-term view. In the first week of Advent we are on a journey towards the feast of Christmas, but more importantly we are at the start of a new year in which we are invited to plan time spent between Jesus' first coming as an infant, and his second coming on Judgement Day. We are warned not to spend life as Noah's neighbours did, rushing around determined to realise our own agendas without a thought for God or how we might be judged.

Jesus talks about Judgement Day and its unexpected arrival not to frighten us, but to encourage us to take responsibility for the here and now. Jesus takes a dim view of those who sit back and do nothing. Today's gospel is a wake-up call for all of us who are not fully realising God's possibilities in our lives. We needn't let life pass us by if we have a plan of action. We needn't fear the future if we are prepared. Jesus shows us the lessons from the past so that we might start preparing for our future right now in the present.

Advent is a separate season in the Church's Liturgical Year. It is the beginning of our Liturgical Year. The Mass Books are changed over. The Sunday Readings will be from Year A (1) Matthew and the Weekday Cycle will be Year 1. We should not just see Advent as a countdown to Christmas but as a time of joyful preparation for the coming of Christ. The emphasis here is on our readiness to meet Christ when he comes. The huge difficulty here is that we anticipate Christmas with music, parties, Christmas Carol Services before Christmas and forget that Christmas has its own season beginning on Christmas Day. During Advent the Gloria is not sung at Mass; there are no flowers in church and the vestments and altar antependia are purple. Advent has the wreath with its candles but it is not a penitential season like Lent.

The Advent Wreath - Today we light the first of our Advent candles. The traditional use

of Advent candles originated in eastern Germany prior to the Reformation. As this tradition came down to us by the beginning of this century, it involved three purple candles and one pink candle. Purple for the royalty of the coming king .... the pink candle was the third candle to be lit on Gaudate Sunday and represents 'joy'. The



gradual lighting of the four candles symbolises the coming light into the world. The wreath itself is also symbolic. The circle of evergreen in which the candles are placed represent everlasting life.

**Saint Andrew the Apostle – 30<sup>th</sup> November** - As one of the twelve apostles, Andrew worked closely with Our Lord during his public life. He was present at the Last Supper, beheld the risen Lord, witnessed the Ascension and shared in the graces and gifts of the first Pentecost. The good deeds and preaching of St. Andrew became known in all parts of the world. According to tradition, a part of the remains of St. Andrew were taken to Scotland, and he was chosen as the Protector of the Scottish people. The Cross of St. Andrew also adorns the British flag where it was placed after the union of Scotland and England.

The Grand Raffle for the hamper and other prizes will be drawn at our meeting on 14<sup>th</sup> December.
