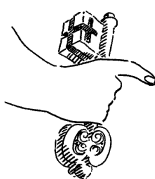


## GOSPEL REFLECTION FOR SOLEMNITY OF SS PETER & PAUL



### Sunday Catholics?

What is religious freedom? It probably means something a bit different for everybody. For most it means the freedom to develop our faith in an atmosphere of support and respect. It might mean, the freedom to promote what we believe whilst respecting the religious freedoms of others. It means valuing the work of our ancestors and of the saints that have gone before us who lived and even died so that we might have choices. It is important, particularly on this the feast day of Saints Peter and Paul, that we do our utmost to protect the religious freedoms of Christians in other countries. We are hearing on the news more and more of Christians who are persecuted, murdered, abducted and displaced. We hear on a daily basis of the many thousands of Christians who have been driven out of their homes and communities. If Saints Peter and Paul were around today they would wonder why we were allowing it to happen.

In today's gospel Jesus turns to Peter and says, "You are Peter, and upon this rock I will build my Church." Whether Jesus' idea of 'Church' is our idea of 'Church' is debateable, but one thing is for sure, Jesus intended to leave behind a group of followers initially led by Peter, united in their belief of Jesus and God until the end of time. Because Peter recognised that God was acting through Jesus, he was entrusted with the job of leading the rest of us. The Church today is a testimony to Peter's faith, it exists because Peter and others like him trusted and believed in God. It exists because Peter and people like Peter acted out their faith despite hostilities and persecution. Do we fully appreciate how useful we could be as part of the Catholic Church? Do we appreciate how much good we can do? How sad if our faith was just about going to church on Sunday. If Saints Peter and Paul were around today would they be closeted up in the front room watching 'Songs of Praise', or would they be out there supporting our Catholic Aid agencies and bombarding our governments.

There is much suffering and pain. We were never promised an easy ride in this world, in fact Saint Paul wrote the following to the Church in Corinth. "That is why, for Christ's sake, I delight in weaknesses, in insults, in hardships, in persecutions, in difficulties. For when I am weak, then I am strong."

**Lay Eucharistic Ministers** are asked to renew their commitment for another year's service at each Mass this weekend.

**First Holy Communion** will be on Sunday, July 12<sup>th</sup> at the 11.00 a.m. Mass. Please note that there will have to be some reserved seating at the front of the church.

**Confirmation** – Bishop Alan said that he would like to confer the Sacrament of Confirmation when we had candidates suitably prepared. It is time to put this on our agenda. There is a lower age limit. Year 8 is being suggested as the lowest age and, of course, there is no upper limit for Confirmation. I would like to suggest to those younger people among us who have not been Confirmed to consider taking this important step in their Christian life. The most important thing at this stage is to avoid the sense of 'being done'. It is a personal step and it has to be appropriate for the person concerned to be Confirmed or not to be Confirmed. Please think about it and pray for guidance on this issue.

**Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament** – I am aware that we have not had Exposition since I came here in January. I have been trying to find a time that is right. I would appreciate suggestions. I think 30 minutes of silent prayer before the Blessed Sacrament is about right, but when? Before Mass? After Mass? At another time? I used to have Exposition before a lunchtime Mass and that worked well. Please put your thinking caps on and try to think of others.

**Saint Thomas the Apostle - 3rd July** - 'Thomas shares the lot of Peter the impetuous, James and John, the "sons of thunder," Philip and his foolish request to see the Father—in fact all the apostles in their weakness and lack of understanding. We mustn't exaggerate these facts, however, for Christ did not pick worthless men. But their human weakness again points out the fact that holiness is a gift of God, not a human creation; it is given to ordinary men and women with weaknesses; it is God who gradually transforms the weaknesses into the image of Christ, the courageous, trusting and loving one.'
