GOSPEL REFLECTION FOR THE THIRTIETH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME



Cry for Help - We all understand Bartimaeus' cry for help, after all, most of us have felt like that at some stage in our lives. How many of us have felt trapped in jobs we hate, in bodies that are weak or in relationships that are failing? Yet how many of us feel that we should accept our gloomy lot in life and suffer in silence? Praying to God for help doesn't seem much of an option in a world governed by science. We have lost our sense of wonderment. We have lost our belief in what we cannot see.

Today Bartimaeus, the blind man, teaches us a lesson in prayer. He certainly wasn't ready to suffer in silence. He cried out and many rebuked him telling him to be silent, but he kept calling out all the more. The lesson is that the blind man's persistence and faith were rewarded.

In our modern-day scientific world, faith is a stumbling point because it suggests believing in things of which there can be no proof - things we can't see. Of course, this is true, but faith also means believing in things that are all around us. Sometimes we suffer in silence when we are surrounded by people who could help us given half the chance. Today we exercise our faith and ask for help. We remember that we have friends, neighbours, professional counsellors and medics who we can call upon. We remember to put our problems before God and ask for help.
