Job Vacancy

It's at this time of year, when the Christmas holiday is well and truly over and it's time to go back to work, that we wonder what we are really doing with our lives. When we meet the first disciples in today's gospel, they are wondering pretty much the same thing. Were they going to spend out the rest of their lives catching fish, or were they going to follow Jesus and become

'fishers of men'? The early disciples were unerring in their discipleship. They left their nets and followed Jesus 'at once' 'immediately'. There was no doubt in their minds about how they wanted to live out their lives. Discipleship was a job for life.

Jesus' work is never done and there will always be vacancies for new disciples. Discipleship is something akin to an army. Without active supporters, a cause can grow faint. We are not asked to keep Christ's teaching to ourselves, we are asked to be 'fishers of men' always opening up God's opportunities to others. The world is a dangerous place full of greed and extremism. There are too many people in the world who feel that money and coercion are the way to get what they want. There are not enough people who believe that love and respect for every human being they meet might be a better answer.

We might feel uncomfortable with the idea of being 'fishers of men'. It conjures the idea of notching up conversions like some kind of biblical salesperson. Today we are asked to sweep our preconceptions aside. Being a 'fisher of men' needs to be about making a real difference in other people's lives by demonstrating our discipleship. Discipleship is a job for life.

Thank You from the Mid-Norfolk Foodbank – The Mid-Norfolk Foodbank have written to thank the parish for its continuing support this past year. Sacred Heart's donations in 2022 totalled 316kg and helped provide 632 emergency meals for people in crisis. They write: "It has been another extremely busy year at Mid-Norfolk Foodbank. The cost-of-living crisis and other global factors have sadly produced queues out the door at times at all three foodbanks in our network. Thankfully, our donors have – as ever – been incredibly generous and we have been able to meet the needs of all those seeking emergency food parcels. Since January 2022 we have fed 4,290 people – a 50% increase on 2021. Total annual donations have weighed an astonishing 55.5 tonnes. Your support has enabled us to continue this vital work. We simply couldn't have done it without you! On behalf of everyone at Mid-Norfolk Foodbank... Thank You."

The story of the conversion of Saul, from the persecutor of Christians to the zealous and holy instrument of evangelisation, Paul, shows the strength of God's power in our lives, and how he can change anything. For each of us there is a job to do. For God, nothing is impossible.

Ordinary People is the theme for Holocaust Memorial Day, 27th January 2023 - There are also extraordinary people in every genocide, remarkable and unusual people, who went to extreme lengths to help, to rescue, to save and in every genocide, there were extraordinary people, who went to extreme depths to cause harm, to persecute, to murder. The HMD theme will also prompt us to consider how ordinary people, such as ourselves, can perhaps play a bigger part than we might imagine in challenging prejudice today. In order to explore the theme of Ordinary People, we are invited to look at some specific categories (perpetrators, bystanders, rescuers).
